Region 16 recognized a few of the Lady Cougars hard work on the field, with four studentathletes being named to First Team All-Region including Bailey Beeler, Gabbie Wiesner, Madie Gentry and Ellie Kiely. Region 16 also recognized Hannah Leahy as a Second Team All-Region player.

"Congratulations to the SCC women's soccer team on another great year and congratulations to those student-athletes who received athletic recognition," said Tim Brix, SCC director of athletics.

The men's team finished their season at 9-9 with an appearance in the regional semi-final against St. Louis Community College (STLCC). The Cougars had a tough matchup against undefeated STLCC but did not back down from the challenge. The men battled but eventually fell by a final score of 4-2, concluding the 2018 season. SCC players, Rhys Thomas and Joe Bell, were recognized by Region 16 as First Team All-Region players and Rafael Lima and Timmy Ballard were named Second Team All-Region players.

The Athletics Department held its second annual Meet 'n Greet with the president in October. The event was a tremendous success, with each head coach giving a team gift to the president. The student-athletes showed respect and support for one another, while also being very professional and polite throughout the event.
