SCC Workforce Development co-sponsors annual community Manufacturing Day Oct. 2

SCC's Workforce Development hosted Manufacturing Day on Oct. 2.

Local high school and middle school students participated in the day, which brought community manufacturers, educators and nearly 800 students together.

Partners included the City of O'Fallon, EDC Business and Community Partners, O'Fallon Chamber of Commerce and Industries, the Greater St. Charles County Chamber of Commerce, St. Charles Workforce and Business Development, Missouri Job Center, Missouri, jobs.mo.gov and several local manufacturers, such as GM Wentzville, True Manufacturing, Seyer Industries, and Patriot Machine, to name a few.

"Manufacturing Day is a great way for us to get in front of students. Young kids are often in front of other professions, such as doctors and engineers, but rarely do they get to see how things are made," said Chris Seyer of Seyer Industries. "That's why it's important for us to introduce high school and middle school kids to manufacturing that is out there – it's in their backyard and is a viable career option."
