REIMAGINING THE VALUE OF PARTNERSHIPS

Expanding westward in St. Charles County, SCC to build regional workforce/technical training center

With strategic partnerships, new workforce programs will help students get into important fields.

Coming soon, SCC plans to expand west, building a regional workforce/ technical training center on land the college purchased in November near the new David Hoekel I-70 Interchange in Wentzville. Plans are moving forward to build the center using funds from Proposition Community College (thanks to the support of voters in August 2020), though the size and scope of the building will depend on amount approved for capital improvement projects from the Missouri Department of Higher Education's MoExcels grant (workforce development funding) and from the American Rescue Plan.

Last year, MoExcels funds helped renovate the space that is now the Field to Table: Culinary and Agricultural Center, at SCC's Dardenne Creek Campus.

In the meantime, SCC is leasing space for welding and other technical programs at the Technical Campus Wentzville, at 209 West Pearce Blvd in Wentzville. This renovated space was also made possible by funds from Proposition Community College.

These partnerships and projects will in turn fuel economic development throughout our community while also supporting the needs of business and industry.



Adult Students Get 'Fast Track' To High Demand Occupations Through Missouri Grant Program

o you think high school students are the only people who qualify for financial aid? Not anymore. Missouri's Fast Track Incentive Grant is for adults.

Adults pursuing a certificate, degree, or industry-recognized credential at SCC for an occupation designated as high demand, can benefit from the Fast Track Workforce Incentive Grant through the Missouri Department of Higher Education.

The financial aid program is for individuals who are 25 years or older or individuals who have not been enrolled in any school within the last two years. The grant will serve students who have not earned a bachelor's degree and are planning to enroll part-time or full-time.



Grant recipients must maintain Missouri residency and work in Missouri for three years after graduation to prevent the grant from becoming a loan that must be repaid with interest.
